



## **Architects named to design** STUDENT LEARNING CENTRE

The university recently announced the selection of Snøhetta of Oslo, Norway and New York City, in association with **Zeidler** Partnership Architects of Toronto as the co-architects for Ryerson's new Student Learning Centre (SLC). Both firms are internationally renowned for their work, and bring a wealth of experience and innovation to designing a space that will spark introspection, interaction and discovery. The Student Learning Centre will dramatically increase study space on campus, offer further opportunities for developing partnerships, and provide a visible connection between the university and the city.

The SLC will be approximately 160,000 square feet and is estimated at 10 floors above grade level, with a connection to the library building and a

retail opportunity on the ground level. Discussions are also underway with the city to provide an entrance to Dundas subway station through the SLC. The projected date of completion for the building is 2013.

With Ryerson students as the primary users of the SLC, their input has played a key role in articulating the function and purpose of the new space. In addition to the feedback gathered through formal mechanisms thus far, representatives from Snøhetta and Zeidler took to the streets to ask students what they would like to see in the new space. The results are available for viewing on YouTube. Look for additional opportunities to contribute ideas to the project in the near future.

And as we expand our digital reach, mobile computing will continue to impact how our users will access digital content. Developing the library in your pocket will establish Ryerson and its library and archives as a leader in emerging technologies, dynamic digital collections and user-driven discovery.

This committee, which meets three times in the fall and winter terms, is designed to facilitate direct communication between the library and the students it serves. The committee is comprised of students who are interested in enhancing library resources and services, providing constructive feedback, and developing ideas for creating a better student experience at the library.

In addition to attending committee meetings, members of RULA-SAC provide a student perspective on library resources and services, participate in the development of surveys and other assessment tools, and represent the library at various events. Members of RULA-SAC played an important role at the Learning Commons Open House, and during the Ask Me – Tell Me! initiative to gather student feedback. The library also sponsored two members of the committee to attend the Ontario Library Association (OLA) Super Conference in February, 2010.

The first year of RULA-SAC was highly successful, and led to initiatives such as the creation of a silent study floor on the library's 10th floor. Thank you to the enthusiastic and engaged students who helped to make RULA-SAC great!

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#### **The Library in Your Pocket**

The library was heavily involved in the Ryerson mobile initiative to expand mobile services at Ryerson. A number of library services, including catalogue searching, room bookings and searching for laptop and desktop computer availability can be accomplished using your mobile device.

The library ran its Mobile Device Survey in November 2009 as a followup to the November 2008 survey to enable the library to make informed decisions about the provision of library services via mobile devices and to see how the mobile landscape is evolving. Knowing what types of mobile devices are in use, what mobile devices are being used for, what services people might want on their next device and what mobile library services our users were interested in seeing the library develop will provide useful data for future mobile applications.

#### Videos and more videos...

Special Collections is quickly establishing itself as a repository for Canadian broadcast history, and students are working diligently at digitizing our video heritage. With the recent donation of the Paddy Sampson fonds, a collection of the CBC producer's televised works and unaired projects, Special Collections has now broken the 1,000 videos mark!



#### **Silent Study Floor**

In order to accommodate the need for silent study space, the library has recently initiated a pilot project to designate the 10th floor as a Silent Study Floor, with the following rules now in place:

- · No talking or whispering

#### **Your Feedback Matters**

The library is participating in several online assessment initiatives, including LibQUAL and the MINES Survey.

<u>LibQUAL+</u> is a survey method developed by the Association of Research Libraries (ARL) used by many Canadian universities to measure library users' perceptions of service quality, compare institutional data with information from peer institutions, and identify best practices in academic libraries. The library participated in LibQUAL for the second time in March, 2010. Results from the previous survey in 2007 are available <u>online</u>.

In addition to LibQUAL, the library will be participating in the MINES Survey from February, 2010 until February, 2011. This online survey collects demographic information about users of electronic resources, as well as information about the purpose of their research. Users will be asked to complete a short survey during one in every 250 requests to access an e-resource through our Get It! Ryerson link.

Your feedback is important, particularly as we plan for the new Student Learning Centre – so tell us what you think!

#### **Olympic Watch**

In celebration of the Winter Olympics and Paralympics in Vancouver, the library created an innovative mash-up that integrated automatic updates of medal standings with Google maps, statistical data and historical images of the Olympics from library collections. Olympic Watch used RSS feeds to provide instant updates of medal counts as they were reported on the official Olympic website and was viewable in the library during the Olympics. Users were able to view the geographic location of the country, as well as statistical data and selected images. Please note that Mozilla Firefox is required to view Olympic Watch.
